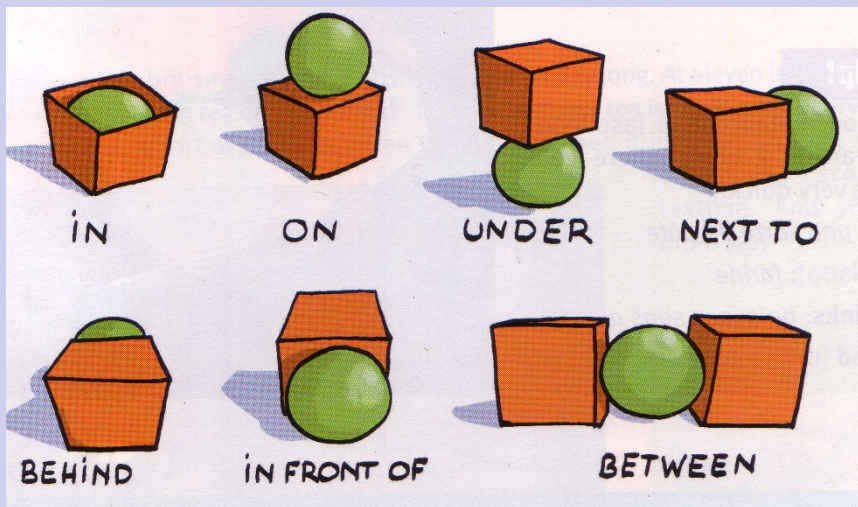

# Perfect Prepositions and Pronouns.



PRONOUNS

# Prepositions

- A **preposition** is a word that relates a noun or a pronoun to another word in the sentence.
- It tells us **where, the location** in relation to other things

# Pronouns ...

- A pronoun is used in place of a noun.
- A singular pronoun names one person or thing.
- A plural pronoun names more than 1 thing or person.
- A possessive pronoun is used to show ownership or possession.

## Pronoun Chart

	Subject Pronouns	Object Pronouns	Possessive Adjectives	Possessive Pronouns	Reflexive Pronouns
1 <sup>st</sup> person	I	me	my	mine	myself
2 <sup>nd</sup> person	you	you	your	yours	yourself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (male)	he	him	his	his	himself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (female)	she	her	her	hers	herself
3 <sup>rd</sup> person	it	it	its	(not used)	itself
1 <sup>st</sup> person (plural)	we	us	our	ours	ourselves
2 <sup>nd</sup> person (plural)	you	you	your	yours	yourselves
3 <sup>rd</sup> person (plural)	they	them	their	theirs	themselves

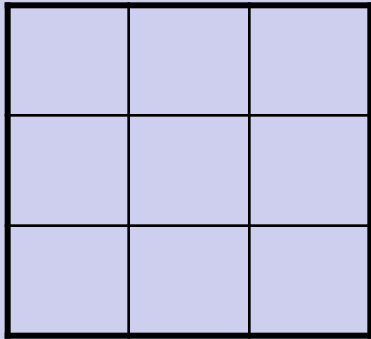
# What's Wrong?
